Tips for Button Trading!

Chantel's Travel Tips for Congressional Visits

Please remember to bring your "History Day at the American History Museum" pin to the Congressional visits on Wednesday afternoon. Following the Congressional visits, follow the Minnesota Herd to the American History Museum for the first ever Night at the Museum. Today, the Minnesota Delegation will be traveling via the Metro to visit congressional representatives and attend the National History Day Smithsonian night in D.C. Here are a few tips that will help expedite the process:

- 1. Master the farecard vending machine! The vending machines, located outside of the College Park metro station, take credit, debit and cash. The wmata.com trip planner estimates that the cost for our trip from College Park to Congressional visits to the Smithsonian and back to College Park is about \$7. You may visit http://wmata.com/fares/ for further information.
- 2. Purchase the right farecard for you! You may purchase a "single fare pass," in which you place an amount of your choice onto the card. The other potential option is the "single day pass" for \$9.
- 3. Use the farecard properly! You only need to use your farecard when you enter the metro station and when you exit the metro station. You DO NOT need to use your farecard when you transfer lines—for example, when we switch from the green line to the orange line you will not need to use your farecard.
- 4. Obey escalator and stair law! When entering or exiting metro stations, you often find that many people are running up and down escalators/stairs. It is common practice for those who are not running from station to station to stand to the right of the escalator or walk up/down the <u>right side</u> of the stairs. If you do not obey this law, you may be rudely pushed or receive a vicious stink eye (or both).
