Expert Tips: Jill's Picture-Taking How To



Selfie: This picture is easiest to take on an iPhone because of the front facing camera. Make sure that you are the only one in the picture (hence the name 'selfie.') Smile! You're fabulous.



Photo Bomb: This type of picture is harder to obtain and requires some strategy. First, you need to find someone else taking a photo of their own. Without them noticing, try to jump into either the foreground or background of their photo. Make sure to make a goofy face. Thier photo was probably going to be boring without you!



Jumping Photo: This photo can be taken individually or in a group of up to 5 people. More than that requires a permit from the safety committee.
