Solid answers and good use of sources will help you take all THOSE NOTES AND ORGANIZE THEM INTO A QUALITY PROJECT.

Introduction/Thesis:

1.) What is your thesis statement? It should include a version with the theme words (Debate and Diplomacy)

2.) How does your topic connect to the theme Debate and Diplomacy? What good quotes, headlines or other primary sources will help you prove this point (directly write them here OR write about your best sources with these sorts of things in them that you are going to be sure to spotlight in your project)?	What sources do you have that will show this?

Background & context--(Use your Story Map to help you with this!)

What's context? Historical context is everything that affects an era, including the political, social, cultural, and intellectual environment that surrounds any historical actor or action. It is the "big picture," in which your topic occurred.

3.) The world was different before your topic. Show the audience the specifics of what that world was like. What other significant events were taking place that led to the development of your topic (or impacted it at the time)? Put your topic in HISTORICAL CONTEXT.	What sources do you have that will show this?

Consider factors like the <i>economics of the time</i> , <i>available technology</i> , <i>social structure</i> (rich/poor), the <i>influence of culture</i> , <i>political atmosphere</i> and <i>influence of religion</i> . This is more HISTORICAL CONTEXT.	(LIST THOSE EXCELLENT headlines, stories or quotes from your sources can you use to show this? Check your sources or go back and dig for these sources so they tell the story for you.)
 6.) What People/Ideas/Events immediately came immediately before the your topic? DEFINE THE DEBATE that happened. What kind of a debate was it? What kind of diplomacy? What were the two sides of the debate? Who benefitted? Who lost out? DEFINE THE DIPLOMACY that happened. What were the two sides of the Diplomacy? Who benefitted? Who lost out? How was compromise used? 	(LIST THOSE EXCELLENT headlines, stories or quotes from your sources can you use to show this? Check your sources or go back and dig for these sources so they tell the story for you.)
7.) Who are significant individuals/groups related to your thesis? How did those individuals/groups who were directly involved come to be? What role did they play in the world and in the topic? CONNECTION TO THEME & HISTORICAL CONTEXT	(LIST THOSE EXCELLENT headlines, stories or quotes from your sources can you use to show this? Check your sources or go back and dig for these sources so they tell the story for you.)
