Dear Sir: Max Mason , who was tried and convicted in my court in St. Louis county, and sentenced to Stillwater penitentiary - I have always had some doubt about his gilt, and had it not been that his counsel raised some intal questions that I thought should be passed upon by the Supreme Court. I was of the intention to set aside the verdict and grant a new trial. 1 Atomas In the evidence, it appeared from the testimony of the girl in chestion and her ascort that five of the negroes had intercourse with her while she was in a faint, and her family physician who examined her about ten o'-clock the following day found no trace of any one hav-ing had intercourse with her, as her organs were normal, no bruises, no inflammation - that while it was possible that they could have had intercourse with her, it did not appear to be probable, and the evidence of iden-tification was far from satisfactory. I am of the opinion that Max Mason should be pardoned at this time. I, therefore, earnestly recommend that he be either paroled or pardoned. Yours truly first Serdal
